

END HUMAN TRAFFICKING & PROTECT GEORGIA'S MOST VULNERABLE

Human trafficking is organized crime, modern-day slavery, and a child-protection emergency.

As governor, Rick Jackson will build on the work of First Lady Marty Kemp and Attorney General Chris Carr with a zero-tolerance strategy and one clear objective: **make Georgia the worst place in America for human traffickers and the safest place in America for victims.**

PUT GEORGIA'S META SETTLEMENT TO WORK

Georgia's share of Attorney General Carr's landmark Meta settlement could reach nearly \$135 million. Jackson will work with the Attorney General and General Assembly to direct it largely toward protecting children, locating missing youth, strengthening enforcement and helping survivors rebuild their lives.

PROTECTING CHILDREN ONLINE: ONE STANDARD FOR EVERY PLATFORM

Make the child-safety protections secured in the Meta settlement the standard across every major social media platform operating in Georgia:

- Meaningful age assurance and parental authorization
- Age-appropriate content controls
- Protections against harmful content and online bullying
- Practical parental oversight tools
- Reasonable time limits
- School-hour and nighttime protections
- Restrictions on push notifications during the school day
- Limits on social-comparison features

Parents should be in charge of their children - not algorithms, predators, or Silicon Valley executives.

FIVE STEPS TO HUNT TRAFFICKERS AND PROTECT VICTIMS

1. STATEWIDE STRIKE FORCE

Unite the GBI, Attorney General's Office, specialized prosecutors, local and federal law enforcement, DFCS, cybercrime investigators and survivor organizations.

Give the force the badges, subpoena power and budget to identify networks, follow the money, recover victims, arrest buyers and sellers, and dismantle trafficking organizations.

Conduct targeted operations around major events and travel surges.

2. TARGET ILLICIT BUSINESSES

Use unannounced inspections, coordinated investigations, licensing enforcement, financial investigations, and criminal prosecution to shut down illicit massage businesses and other trafficking fronts.

Go after buyers, sellers, recruiters, owners and financial networks while putting victim protection first.

3. RECOVER MISSING CHILDREN

Give every missing-child case an immediate trafficking-risk assessment.

Create a rapid-response system linking law enforcement, child welfare, schools and partner agencies so information moves immediately.

Use cyber technology, data analytics and appropriate AI to identify recruitment patterns, trace financial activity and locate children faster.

4. LASTING RECOVERY FOR SURVIVORS

A child is not truly rescued if she is returned to the same instability that made her vulnerable.

Provide safe housing, trauma-informed care, health care, education, job training, legal assistance, transportation and a path to independence.

No survivor should be abandoned after rescue.

5. MEASURE RESULTS AND MAKE THEM PUBLIC

Create a public Human Trafficking Results Dashboard tracking victims recovered, missing children located, traffickers and buyers prosecuted, networks disrupted, response times and survivor outcomes. Measure success by children brought home, predators behind bars and survivors given a genuine second chance.
